### COURSE DESCRIPTION

Papa 'Ōlelo Hawai'i 102 is the continuation of 101. Students in this course will build on the basic pepeke, vocabulary, and cultural knowledge learned in 101. New grammar will be introduced that is built on the four basic pepeke already learned- Pepeke Painu, Pepeke Henua, Pepeke 'Aike 'O, and Pepeke 'Aike He. The emphasis of the 102 course is on mastering usage of vocabulary and pepeke in conversational Hawaiian. A new emphasis on correct pronunciation and intonation be stressed in this course. Between 40%-50% of class time will be used to practice speaking and listening, and to a lesser degree reading and writing.

### LEARNING OUTCOMES

#### Students will:

- Engage in Hawaiian language conversations with classmates and instructor.
- Demonstrate knowledge of pepeke and vocabulary words
- Retell past events or feelings.

- Speak about things that will happen in the future.
- Speak about locations of events, people, and things in time and space.
- Make requests, ask questions, and make statements based on empirical evidence.
- Understand the meaning of Hawaiian poetry contained in mele.

## ATTENDANCE

Students are expected to attend all classes and participate fully. If students miss a class, they should watch the video of the class they missed and complete all assignments. Please notify Piliaka of your absence as a courtesy.

## HA'AWINA (LESSONS, ASSIGNMENT)

Ha'awina is given out at every class. If nothing is assigned, students should continue to study the vocabulary words. Students are expected to learn all new grammar patterns presented in the course.

## VOCABULARY QUIZZES

A vocabulary quiz will be given weekly. Students should study for the quizzes by making flashcards, practice saying the words out loud, and most importantly, using the words. The quizzes will be in multiple formats and will test spelling (using kahakō and 'okina), and knowledge of meaning. Listening and writing skills will be tested.

## PRESENTATIONS

Students will present two hō'ike in Hawaiian language. One will be a slide show of their personal story (revised from Papa 101). The other hō'ike, is called a hō'ike'ike and this is a demonstration presentation of how to make something. This is a live demonstration for 10-15 minutes.

## FINAL ASSESSMENT

Students are expected to sit for a final assessment at the end of the course. This assessment allows the student to demonstrate their competencies with the language by engaging in a structured conversation with the instructor, classmates, and other Hawaiian speakers. Students who meet the minimum competency of the course will receive a First Year Hawaiian Language Competency Certificate.
